<u>5 GRADERS ENGLISH ACTIVITIES UNIT 6 (1)</u>

Hello everybody! I hope things are OK!! I'm pretty sure that all of you are making a great effort in order to get the best result in everything you have been doing. I congratulate you on your wonderful work.

Now, it is time to start Unit 6. This unit is called *AWESOME ART*. It is an interesting unit in which you are going to learn some vocabulary related to everyday objects and adjectives to describe objects, and the most important features about a new verb tense, the PRESENT PERFECT, and the RELATIVE PRONOUNS. What is the Present Perfect? What are the Relative Pronouns? No worries. You will



learn everything about grammar and vocabulary throughout this unit. In addition, not only will you learn grammar and vocabulary, but you will continue practising and improving your listening, reading and writing skills.

The first thing you have to do is to **copy the general outline of this unit in your notebook**:

Here you have the definition of each word and a picture as a clue. Will you able to guess the meaning?

-Saw: a tool for cutting, usually a thin blade of metal with sharp teeth.



-Light switch: a switch most commonly used to operate electric lights, permanently connected equipment, or electrical outlets.



-Kettle: a pot, a metal container in which to boil water or other liquids, cook foods, etc.



-Fridge: a room or large appliance in which food, drink, etc., is kept cool especially by means of mechanical refrigeration.



-Clothes peg: a device, such as a forked piece of wood or plastic, for fastening articles to a clothesline.



-Iron: an electrical appliance with a flat metal bottom, used when heated to press or smooth clothes, linens, etc.



-Vacuum cleaner: an electrical appliance for cleaning carpets, floors, etc., by suction.



-Toaster: an appliance for toasting bread, muffins, etc.



-Drill: a tool with a cutting edge for making holes in firm materials, especially by rotation.



-Thread: a thin, fine cord of fiber spun out to great length.



-Plug: an attachment at the end of an electrical cord, inserted into a socket for electric power.



-Needle: a small, rod-like instrument, usually of steel, with a sharp point at one end and a hole for thread at the other end, used for passing thread through cloth to make stitches in sewing.



Have you guessed the meaning? Copy them in your notebook!




Answer: The object described in the text is an enormous street sculpture in London.



The first time, read the text in silence while you listen to the text paying special attention to pronunciation. Secondly, try to read the text aloud and listen to the recording at the same time.

The story of the WEEE Man

Our reporter has travelled to Cornwall to say Happy Birthday to the WEEE Man!

The WEEE Man is a sculpture. He's called the WEEE Man because he's made of old machines people don't want or WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment).

In 2004, the Royal Society of Arts (RSA) wanted to teach people about WEEE. They wanted to show how much electrical equipment people waste in their lifetime. They decided to build a sculpture and they asked an artist called Paul Bonomini to design it.

Paul created an enormous robot and in April 2005 British people saw the WEEE Man for the first time. The sculpture is 7 metres tall and it weigh: 3.3 tonnes. This is the same amount of WEEE the average British person throws away in their lifetime.

The average person throws away 5 fridges, 12 kettles, 3 washing machines, 8 toasters, 8 irons, 35 mobile phones, 8 computers, 4 keyboards, 23 keyboard mice and 6 TVs!

First the WEEE Man stood outside City Hall in London, but he's now at the Eden Project in Cornwall. Today is his fifth birthday. Lots of people come to see the sculpture every year.

'I've come to see the WEEE Man because we've just done a project about recycling at school,' says schoolboy Jack Taylor. 'I've made a model of a WEEE boy! I've used food tins.'

His schoolmate Tara Smith adds, 'I haven't made a model, but I've painted a picture of the WEEE Man. I think he's really cool!'

'I've visited the WEEE Man lots of times,' says Mary Magee from Oxford. 'I've just taken lots of photographs to show my grandchildren. The WEEE Man is very important because it has taught people about recycling.'

Her husband Bob Magee adds, 'I've just thrown away an old radio! But now I've seen the WEEE Man, I understand that we shouldn't waste so much.'

Quite right! Thank you WEEE Man! We've learnt a lot from you!




